What if light could reveal the memory of the land?

Soil is shaped over countless years, carrying the layered traces of lives, landscapes, and constructions. Unlike in ancient times—when it lived close to us in walls, pottery, and daily life—our dialogue with this material feels distant in the modern city.

Time in Soil is a table lamp whose shade is made from soil, reflecting the unique context and memory of its origin. The landscapes and stories seen within these earthy surfaces may differ from person to person, shaped by each viewer's own memories and imagination.

PROCESS

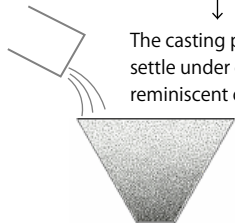
Soil emerges from rock, life, and human traces, layering into the character of place.



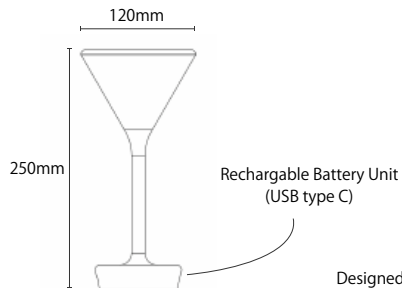
One contemporary designer chose to look into the stories carried by soil and to bring them to light.

The casting process lets soil particles settle under gravity, forming a gradient reminiscent of the Earth's formation.



DETAILS



Designed to bring a quiet elegance to the table—echoing the motif of a cocktail glass—while keeping a low profile that never interrupts communication.



Light diffuses gently through the soil and radiates horizontally, filling the table space with a soft glow.
